- Off the Victorian radar
- Racing group down to three sailors out of a total of 30
- More time spent rescuing than coaching
- Reasonable intake but poor progression
- Little support for change from the club's hierarchy
- Fantastic support from members and parents

Actions



- Coaches
 - Bottom Up (build the funnel)
 - Support (WIP)
 - Sailing parents
 - Skills
 - Technical, Relationship & Organisational
- Class agnostic
 - A market rather than a product driven strategy
- Safety, clear decision making responsibility
- Further strengthen our relationship with Black Rock YC

Actions

- New people on the Junior Committee
 - Head of Coaching, Head of Safety,
- Better tools
 - Ozi Optis for beginners
 - Reefed Sabot Sails
- Parents
 - Tell them what we do, e.g. Safety
 - Start to involve them on and off the water
 - Break down the gender divide
 - Social The beer and pizza strategy
- Adventure Sailing



Where are we now





Where are we now



- 67 sailors and average attendance of 91% every Sunday in Season
- A more even spread of age groups from 8 to 13
- Renewed focus at the racing end of the fleet
- Fantastic succession at Committee level
- The Junior Committee is now the Junior and Transition Committee
- More than half the Committee originally came from outside the club
- Profitable, \$10k returned to the club over the last three years

The next steps

- Better engaging of parents
 - Monthly coffee mornings
 - Away regattas fun for the whole family, AWYC already in our program.
- Building a very strong sense of team
 - Establishment of a Racing Squad who are awarded jackets
 - Bibs for each sailing group
 - A den
- Establishing a youth transition group
 - Empowerment
 - High potential sailors
 - Others Etchells, keel boats, Race Management, Other classes
