Mid 00's

- Council moved away from building a marina and put focus on redeveloping a new club house
- Initially FYC declined, but were then faced with the order to have all asbestos removed from club rooms

- 2013
 - FYC packs up to move out
 - Council put project on hold due to funding issues

Club Direction

Create a building for the future, not just for today!

- Develop a long term strategic plan
 - » Where are you today?
 - » How do you plan to get to the future
- What will your building require?





Develop and understand your club policies

- Important that its clear on how decisions will be made regarding the club and the building
- Create a policy regarding authorisation of decisions
 - Commodore?
 - Min of 2 committee representatives?
 - When should the membership be involved?
 - How should email communication be made? E.g always cc in the secretary





Be well organised

- Have a dedicated place to store all documents
 - I use a filefax as I no longer have an office to store everything.
 - Keep a designated note book, date all conversations and take note of any phone calls or verbal discussions
 - Don't rely on others (councils, builders, developers) to take detailed notes or min







Learn who to speak with

- Important to have an understanding of the different departments your speaking too.
- Know who can provide you with the answers to particular questions.
- Know the people who will look after your best interest USE THEM (sports rec officers are their to represent you)
- Remember no question is stupid (like where are the hot water systems and why is their no door to the beach?)
- Ensure you receive an answer follow up if you do not








Read, Re-read, clarify
